In the end, it is always our example of hard work, attitude, volunteer spirit, and our love, that shines in our community and club, and moreover, in our children.

The Christmas message has always been about a special child being born in tough conditions and the example he showed to his people to how to treat other people. The same rings true for us in the example we continually set for our children so hopefully they can become a better version of us when they're adults.
